This means we will soon be reaching the mid-way point of the first quarter. The month of August flew by and before you know it, the first quarter's end will be upon us.

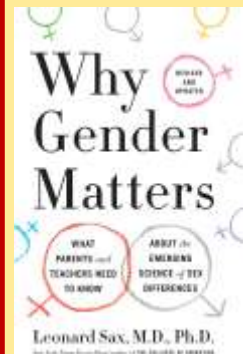
EASYCBM... Teachers in all grades K-8 have been administering the Fall EasyCBM Benchmark Assessment in Reading and Math. This battery of tests helps us to determine if a child is above, at or below grade level in Reading and Math. If they are below grade level (in this case the 50th percentile) chances are we will suggest an intervention or extra practice to improve their skills. During the parent-teacher conferences, teachers will be sharing the results with parents. Here are few things to keep in mind as we progress through the school year.

1. If your child reads 15 minutes each day, he or she will likely read at grade level. If he or she reads an hour each day he or she may be at the 99th percentile.
2. If your child knows their math facts by heart and can answer a question like "how much is 4 x 6 within 1-2 seconds, they will be better equipped to do mathematical problem-solving. Students should not be using calculators to solve basic math problems.
3. Your child may be able to read fluently but be having difficulty comprehending what he or she is reading, spending time daily asking them to explain what they have read, will aid them in comprehension.
4. One of the keys to improving comprehension is vocabulary. The more words one is exposed too, the more likely they are to comprehend what they are reading. When one is reading, making notes will help with comprehension and recalling what was read.

The reason teachers ask student to do homework is to achieve the following:

- To instill a skill taught in class.
- To provide ongoing repetition; to gain understanding of a skill or concept takes reviewing the skill at least 7 times.
- To master a skill previously taught, one has to practice the skill many times. A child may get it (the skill) in class, but if they don't practice the skill they will not master it.
- In order to be good at anything, regardless if it is writing an essay or shooting fous shots on the basketball court, one must practice, practice, and practice.



Are boys and girls really that different? Twenty years ago, doctors and researchers didn't think so. Back then, most experts believed that differences in how girls and boys behave are mainly due to differences in how they were treated by their parents, teachers, and friends. On September 15, 2017 there will be a Home and School general meeting in the Library after drop off. 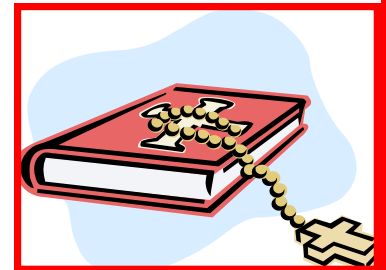

Speech and Language Development in Young Children

It's fun to watch your Preschooler's growth and measure their height. But how can you measure your child's development in other areas such as age appropriate language skills, especially when strong language skills have such a connection to literacy development in Kindergarten and beyond. Your child's vocabulary will support their reading comprehension. And your child's oral language skills can support their ability to decode text. So how can you help your child develop their language skills.

1. Speak to your child in clear, correct, and simple manner. Talking to your child in complete sentence and expecting them to answer is complete sentences build their language skills.
2. Take the time each day to listen and talk with your child. What did you at school to day is a good starter but you can talking what you see out the window as you drive or what you are doing as your cook dinner.
3. When you are speaking with your child, model good listening behavior,
4. Encourage your child to use language (and not just gestures or actions) to express ideas, observations, and feelings. You might have to explain point the difference between mad

and sad but in no time they will be using those words.

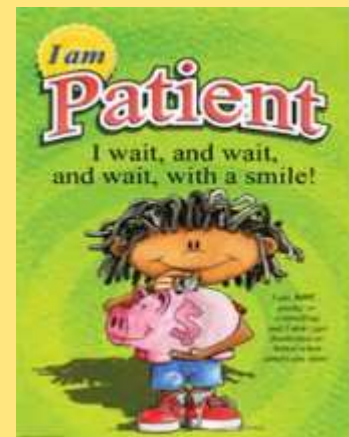
5. Engage your child in activities and game that require listening and follow direction. Simon Says is always fun.

September Christian Virtue Spotlight

Good things come to those that wait, but try telling that to a Preschooler. For young child past and future are way to abstract to understand, they live in the moment. Typically by age two child are able to sit tight for a brief spell when asked. By the time your child turns three, you can expect them to hang in there for several minutes and occupy themselves. However, as parents and educators we can help children even as young as two work on this skill. We simply have to explain, model, and reinforce the concept. At Preschool, we explain patience as waiting, waiting, and waiting with a smile. This month each class will heard stories about a child who were patient...or maybe some of the characters were still working on their patience but you get the point. One story was about a young child who went to the ice cream shop. There was a long line to place their order. Have tried many ways the child learner the only way to get to the counter was to wait, wait, and wait with a smile. Just like the child in the story, there are many ways in every day life to virtue to reinforce the virtue of patience, while standing in line to wash



hands before snack or when waiting for a tricycle to be available, we have many moments to practice to this virtue. At each of these times you can hear teachers praising students for their patience.

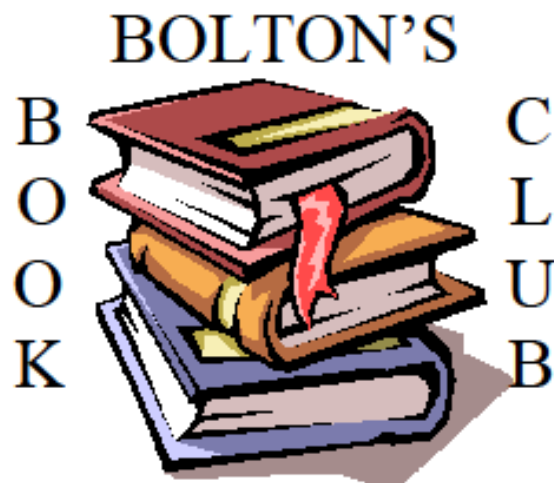

AR Level: 4.8

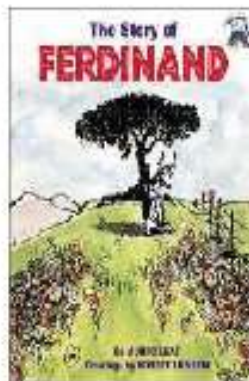
Interest Level: Grades 4 – 8

AR Level: 3.7

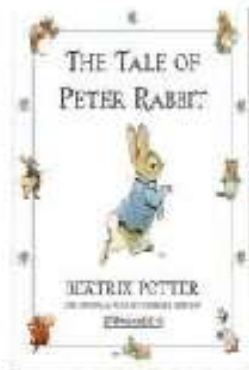
Interest Level: Grades K – 3
